#### Pastoral Letter from Rev John Chambers

#### Dear Friends,

I write this letter to you at the mid-point of the period between the beginning of Epiphany and Easter Day. An epiphany is a life changing revelation and the rising of Christ is for us a life changing moment in the history of the world and for each one who has faith.

In the lectionary this mid-point is marked with the story of the transfiguration of Jesus Christ. (Matthew 17:1 - 9) We have had the wonder and joy of Christmas we now face the rigors of Lent and the Passion culminating in the splendour of the Resurrection. It seems to me that this period of the Christian year is a reflection our Christian journey.

There is that point in our lives when after hearing the story of God's action in Christ we come to that moment when we feel and know it to be true for us and that is a life changing moment. Then begins our journey as a Christian disciple, and that is a time of learning, growing and serving in the church and community. Then as we journey on we will encounter questions, fears, hopes dashed, and perhaps a temptation to turn from this deepening of faith to resting in the backwaters, living off what has been.

But Christ's call is to move on through the dark night, the inertia by holding fast to the Rock of our salvation until we share in that splendour of the resurrection.

Where are you on that journey? Are you still in the childlike wonder of a new found faith, or are you struggling trying to make sense of it all, bogged down in the politics and routine of church life, or perhaps you are wondering what it all means and the journey seems hard and heavy. Maybe you have found, through faith and trust that the risen Christ is with you.

This mid-point, this centre-point, in is a moment for us to reflect on our journey as we move into Lent and Easter, it is an invitation to move on from where we are to where Christ wants us to be. And remember if our faith and trust in God in Christ is to sustain us throughout our journey then Christ must be our anchor, our centrepoint.

The disciples who were with Jesus on that mountain top wanted the moment to last but were encouraged to move on, we too must move on from where we are, the journey is not yet complete, keeping our eyes firmly fixed on Jesus who is the beginning and end of our journey.

May God continue with you this Lent as you ponder on the journey Christ took for us and above all may we all this Easter rejoice in the splendour of Christ alive in us.

Leslie not only did duty on the organ not only twice on Sundays but also for occasions such as funerals and weddings, when he valued the long black robe he could wear to hide his gardening clothes, enabling him to save time when he set off and returned home and trusting that he'd remember to replace his gardening wellies with more appropriate footwear. Everyone knew him as an amiable and even-tempered man whose occupation was to teach history at the local girls' grammar school. Leslie and his wife Sheila brought up four children and were delighted to become grandparents and, in Leslie's case, a great-grandfather when Evelyn was born.

As their children grew up and flew the nest the Johnsons decided to downsize and moved to Gidea Park, one of their criteria being that their new home must be within walking distance of a Methodist church. So began their long connection with Gidea Park MC, where Leslie accompanied the hymn-singing for many years. He and Sheila were always happy to return to HWMC to share activities and when he was left on his own Leslie started coming to our Tuesday Lunch Club, enjoying the lovely meals and the comradeship and playing the piano to accompany the singing of Christmas carols after the Christmas lunch. Alongside this he became a member of the Women's Own and accompanied the singing there too, which was greatly appreciated. We were all greatly saddened by his sudden death but will remember him with great affection.

they have the whole horizon. We  $\,$ 


have a small piece of land to live
